

IRS IMPOSTER SCAMS



- You get a call from someone who says she's from the IRS. She says that you owe back taxes.
- She threatens to sue you, arrest or deport you, or revoke your license if you don't pay right away.
- She tells you to put money on a prepaid debit card and give her the card numbers.
- The caller may know some of your Social Security number. And your caller ID might show a Washington, DC area code. But is it really the IRS calling? No! It's a scam!
- The real IRS won't ask you to pay with prepaid debit cards or wire transfers.
- They also won't ask for a credit card over the phone.
- And when the IRS first contacts you about unpaid taxes, they do it by mail, not by phone.
- And remember caller IDs can be faked.



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Here's what you can do:

1. STOP! HANG UP THE PHONE!

You're not being rude by hanging up - these people are expert scammers and will try everything to get money from you. They may be kind and act like they're your friend - or they may act in a threatening manner. HANG UP! Don't wire money or pay with a prepaid debit card. Once you send it, the money is gone.
